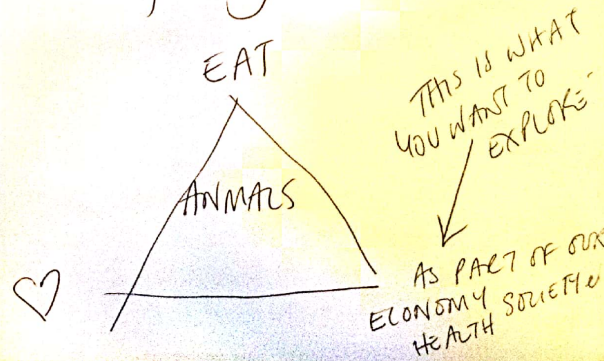

In China, there are not enough rules for animals. There are no specific laws for animal welfare.

Animal Welfare Act

Prior to the Animal Welfare Act, animal welfare law was largely reactive and action could only be taken **once an animal had suffered unnecessarily.**

The 2006 Act has introduced an important and new concept for pet owners and those responsible for domestic animals, e.g. breeders, those who have working animals or farm animals in England and Wales.

Preventing animals suffering

This means enforcement agencies and our inspectors can now act by **advising and educating owners before their pets suffer.** If this advice is not followed or the animal's needs are not being met then action can be taken whether through a formal warning or in some cases a prosecution

What does the law actually say?

1. New Zealand Has Officially Recognized That Animals Are Sentient

New Zealand is considered to be one of the leaders in the field of animal welfare and protection. According to *World Animal Protection*, the New Zealand Animal Welfare Strategy states that animals are sentient, therefore, **all should refer to their pain, distress, and their behavioral needs.** As of now, causing animal suffering through cruelty or failure to act is prohibited, as well as **studies and experiments on animals.** Also, there are **requirements to limit or prevent harm caused to particular animals such as marine mammals and game animals.**

2. In Poland, Anyone Who Finds An Abandoned Dog Must Report It To An Animal Shelter, Fire Authority, Or Police

According to *World Animal Protection*, if you find an abandoned dog, you are required to notify an **animal shelter, fire authority, or police.** It is illegal for a dog to be left to wander and starve on the streets. Also, commercial breeding of cats and dogs is prohibited.

3. In Virginia, Stealing A Dog Can Be Punishable By Up To 10 Years In Jail

As we mentioned before, in many U.S. states, dogs are viewed as **property** by law even though people consider them to be their family members. Therefore when someone steals a dog, in the eyes of the law, it will not be kidnapping and in the majority of the cases, the person can get away with it. Nevertheless, according to *Tingen & Williams*, it won't be that easy in Virginia as stealing a dog is a Class 5 felony which is **punishable by up to 10 years in jail** regardless of the monetary value of the pet.

In The Netherlands, Dog Owners Must Register Their Dogs

The Netherlands is aiming to reduce the number of dogs in the country. Dog owners must be registered with the municipality responsible when making the decision to get a pet.

7 In The UK, Dog Cruelty Will Be Five Years In Prison

According to *Independent*, the UK confirmed that the maximum sentence for dog cruelty will increase. The maximum **fine** will rise from **£5,000 to £20,000** and for more serious cases the maximum sentence will increase from two to five years in prison. This will see a significant increase in serious animal cruelty cases.

8. In Germany, The Fine For Killing A Protected Animal Can Vary Up To 25,000 Euros

Germany is also considered to be an animal-loving country with its animal protection laws. According to *World Animal Protection*, the fine for killing a protected animal can vary up to 25,000 euros and that's a lot of money! Fun fact: wasps are protected in Germany since they don't do any harm and also help clean the environment. However, you don't need to worry about killing a single wasp in Germany and then getting a 25,000 euro fine as the fine would usually be imposed only if you got rid of the whole nest.

9 In Turin, A Dog Owner Is Fined If He Walks The Dog Less Than Three Times A Day

It might be no surprise but **Italy** considers itself to be a very **animal-loving country**, as in many cities, animals are protected by law. However, one city in Italy stands out for its laws on animal welfare. According to *Environmental News Network*, in Turin, **dog owners who walk their pets less than 3 times a day can be fined 500 euros (\$650).** Hard to believe? Animal lovers are also prohibited from dyeing their pet's fur or "any form of animal mutilation" as the city doesn't want Italians to turn their pets into ridiculous fluffy toys!

10. In Oklahoma, The Dog Owner Is Fully Responsible For Any Injuries His Dog Might Cause

Oklahoma has seriously strict laws in regards to dog bites! According to *AllLaw*, if a person gets bitten or injured by a dog, he has two years to file a lawsuit in the state's civil court system. And that's a really long time! The dog owner is responsible for any injuries his dog causes even if the owner didn't know that his dog might bite another person or simply act this way. However, the good news is that the dog owner might raise a few defenses if the injured person provoked the dog.

4. In Alaska, When One Wants To Divorce Their Spouse, The Judge Decides Who Gets The Animal
In most U.S. states when a married couple decides to get a divorce, their pets are treated the same way as property. However, according to the *Washington Post*, in 2017, Alaska became the first state to change this matter and its divorce laws. Now, in case of divorce and legal separation, the animals are treated almost the same way as the children, the judge determines who will get custody of the pet taking into consideration what's best for them.

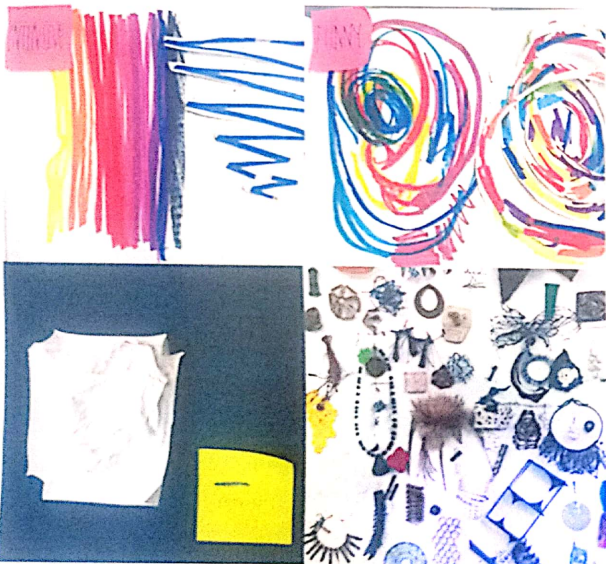

Workshop Description

Consider using found materials, workshop off cuts or very simple materials. You may wish to go to the Pound Shop and buy materials there. Remember to take photographs in the workshops.

Step 4.

At 4.00pm, as a group we will work collectively to make a materials wall for Unit 4.

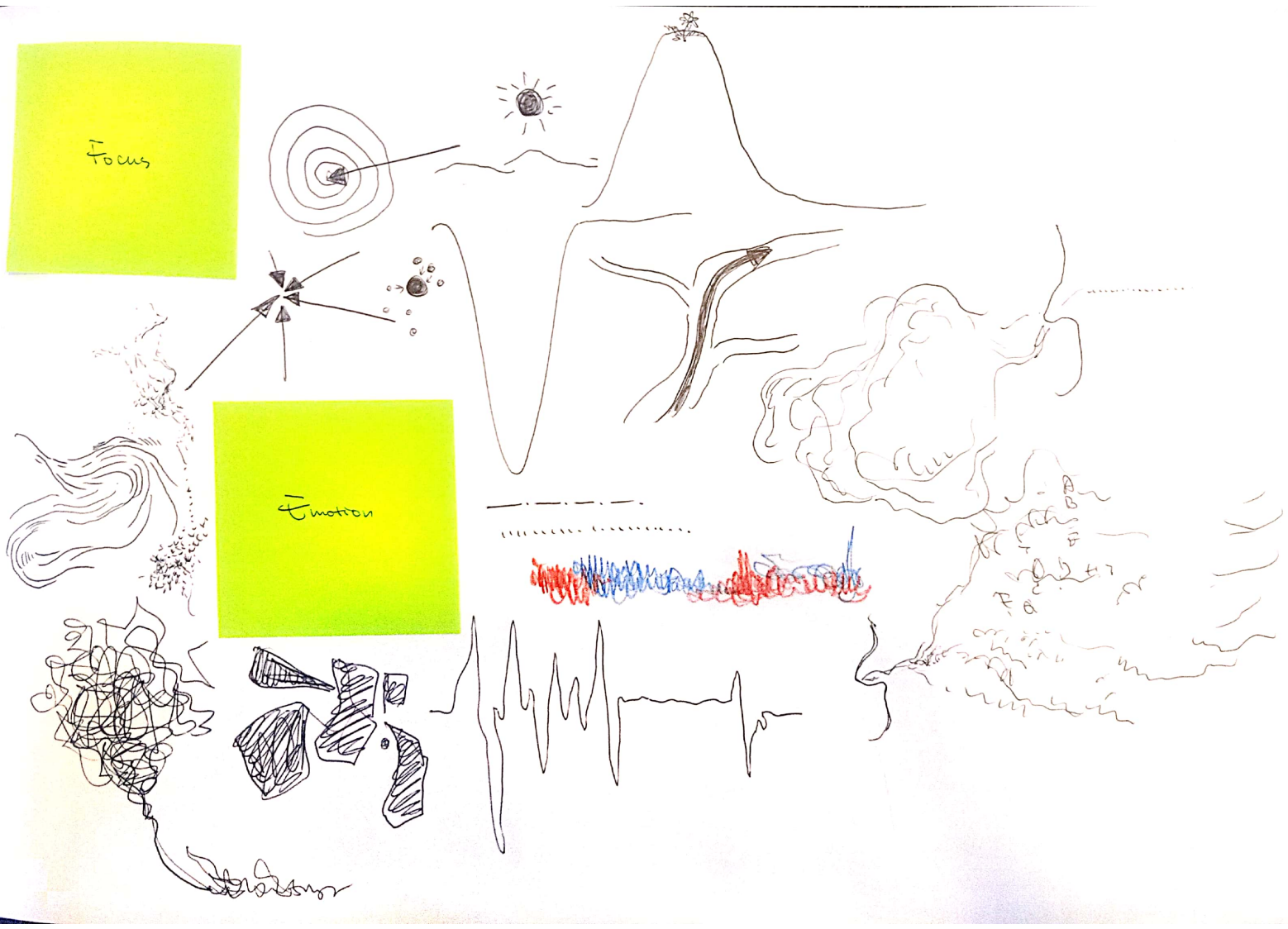

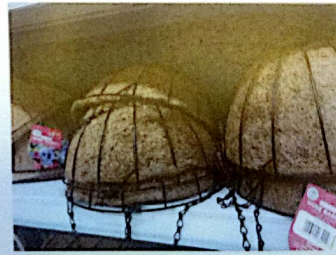

5 Research Analysis Workshop

Workshop Description

This workshop will guide you through a few techniques for organising, analysing and reflecting on your research. You can come back to these techniques at any time during the project, or adapt them to suit your individual working methods.

Get ready

This is a group workshop. Each student should bring 10 printed secondary research images. Place students in peer learning groups of 4-8 individuals whose themes or projects have something in common. Each group should have some large paper and pens.

(If you are doing the workshop independently follow the instructions below using at least 30 images from your secondary research)

Task 1: Identify themes (Working together as a group)

1. Mix up all your images. Now group them into as many different themes as possible.
2. Themes could be led by visual appearance (e.g. natural surfaces, bright colours) meaning or interpretation (e.g. traditional, precious) or materials (e.g. industrial, textile).
3. Record each group of images as a theme before you reorganise them. Themes may have only 3 or 4 images, or they may be very large. Identify as many themes as possible.

On Workflow and in your sketchbook

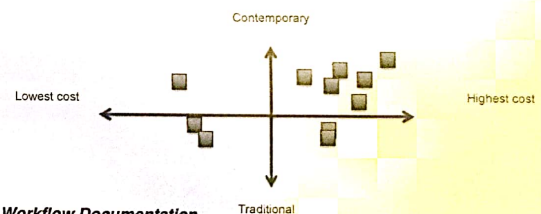
- Take notes and photographs of the themes that interest you most, reflect on what you are interested in and explain why
- Share information about your research references with your peers. Write down details of their references so that you can research them independently
- Add new research references to your bibliography
- Gather your individual research into themes for your sheets / sketchbooks
- Respond to new themes with drawings / ideas

Task 2: Sliding Scales (Working together as a group)

1. Mix up all your research images again. This time you are looking for possible scales on which to arrange the research references. What are the 'more' or 'less' judgements that you can make? Are there opposites that you can see?
2. Try to re-arrange the images on several scales, e.g. Hardest to softest, oldest to newest. Arrange the images from most to least on the scales that you identify. Place the images where you think they belong on the scale. There may be busy clusters or big gaps which show you the areas that the researchers (the students in the group) found most / least interesting, or easiest / hardest to research.
3. Combine two scales on an X and Y axis to give a more complex layer of interpretation, see the example below.

On Workflow and in your sketchbook

- Where on the scales do you want your work for the project to 'fit in'? This will immediately help you define your intentions and later on it will help you to evaluate your ideas / outcomes
- Gather your own research images into sliding scales. Identify the area that you want to focus on. This will help you to focus on the research that interests you most.

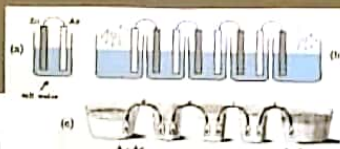

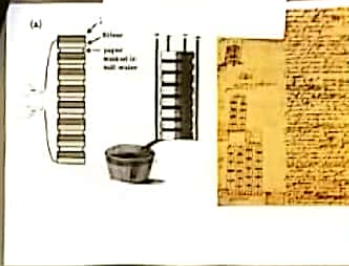
